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Punic Wars [(pyooh-nik)] Three wars between ancient Carthage and Rome in the third and second centuries b.c. Hannibal led the forces of Carthage in the second Punic War.

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The three Punic Wars between Carthage and Rome took place over nearly a century, beginning in 264 B.C. and ending with the destruction of Carthage in 146 B.C.

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the three wars waged by Rome against Carthage, 264 241, 218 201, and 149 146 b.c., resulting in the destruction of Carthage and the annexation of its territory

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
